The world is getting hotter, and that's a big problem — especially for children in Africa. Our campaign is called "TOO HIGH!" because the Earth has already warmed by 1.1°C, and that's already too much for children to handle.



Climate change is like a wild monster — it brings floods, droughts, heatwaves, and changes when and how it rains. Africa is one of the places being hurt the most, even though it caused the least damage to the planet. Children are strong, but their bodies and lives are more affected by these changes. They get sick more often, lose their homes, and sometimes can't go to school because of floods or extreme heat. One child, Nkosilathi from Zimbabwe, said:

#### When it doesn't rain, we suffer. And now when it does rain, it floods and we suffer.

Even a small temperature rise — like 1.1°C — is dangerous. Scientists hoped we could stay under 1.5°C, but even that is risky. Right now, this heat is already hurting millions of children in Africa. That's why we call it TOO HIGH!

Why TOO HIGH?

Many climate plans forget about children. Money and action often don't reach the places where children need help most. We want countries to:

- Build stronger schools and safer places
- Teach children what to do in floods or heatwaves
- Make sure children's rights are always included

The ACERWC (a special group that looks after children's rights in Africa) says helping children should come first in every climate plan.

#### Our campaign has two goals:



Protect children from harm — by preparing for floods, droughts, and heat.




Let children speak up — their ideas and voices matter in climate decisions.
